Study of the Readings

Background on the Gospel

Reading John 15:1-8

Today's reading from the Gospel of John is part of Jesus' discourse at the Last Supper. John tells the story of Jesus' Last Supper differently from the other Evangelists. It begins with Jesus washing his disciples' feet and providing them with a series of instructions. We call this section the Last Supper discourse. In these chapters of John's Gospel, Jesus instructs his disciples about the importance of following his example of love and service, about the gift they will receive when Jesus sends them the Holy Spirit, and about their relationship with Jesus and with the world. In today's Gospel Jesus speaks about his relationship to his disciples. In his metaphor of the vine and the

branches, Jesus is referencing the Hebrew Scriptures where Israel is the vineyard, and Yahweh himself tends the vineyard. One of the primary themes of John's Gospel is to show Jesus to be the fulfillment of God's promises to Israel. In this passage, Jesus teaches his disciples that his relationship with them will not end after his death; he will remain with them always. This unity between Jesus and his disciples is the basis for their ability to continue to do the work that he began. Similarly, Jesus' presence with us through the Gift of the Holy Spirit enables us to continue the work of love and reconciliation that he began. Jesus also teaches his disciples about the importance of the words he has taught to them. Just as Jesus will remain in the disciples, so too will his words. We come to know Jesus through

the Scriptures, the living Word of God. Our commitment to be Christ's disciples is sustained through God's Word. This commitment is also strengthened by our life of prayer and nourished by the Eucharist. Through the Eucharist, Jesus dwells in us, remains with us, and transforms us so that we might bear fruit in his name. We observe many people who act in ways that show their commitment to serve their neighbor. Christians and non-Christians feed the hungry, care for the sick, shelter the homeless, and give alms to the poor. These actions become acts of Christian discipleship when they are motivated by our relationship with Jesus. Whatever the immediate results, Jesus promises us that these actions will bear fruit when we undertake them in his name.

Observamos a muchas personas que actúan de maneras que muestran su compromiso de servir a su prójimo. Cristianos y no cristianos alimentan a los hambrientos, cuidan a los enfermos, albergan a los desamparados y dan limosna a los pobres. Estas acciones se convierten en actos de discipulado cristiano cuando están motivadas por nuestra relación con Jesús. Cualesquiera que sean los resultados inmediatos, Jesús nos promete que estas acciones darán fruto cuando las emprendamos en su nombre.

PARISH NEWS

GUIDANCE ON THE DISPOSITION OF CREMATED REMAINS

On July 5, 1963, the Instruction *Piam et Constantem* was published by the then Holy Office which permitted cremation as an alternative to burial for the disposition of the remains of deceased Catholics. Since then, this practice has been incorporated into the Code of Canon Law (1983) and the Code of Canons of Oriental Churches (1990).

There are several guidelines of note regarding cremation:

- 1) The ashes of the deceased are not to be scattered.
- 2) The ashes are not to be separated and shared among family.
- 3) The ashes must be treated with the same respect and dignity as the human body and be housed in sacred places. This cements a core principle of our faith—the belief in resurrection. Additionally, housing cremated remains in such sacred places allows for the deceased to be prayed for when Masses are held at the cemetery.

NOTICIAS PARROQUIALES

ORIENTACIÓN SOBRE LA DISPOSICIÓN DE LOS RESTOS CREMADOS

El 5 de julio de 1963, el entonces Santo Oficio publicó la Instrucción *Piam et Constantem* que permitía la cremación como alternativa al entierro para la disposición de los restos de los católicos fallecidos. Desde entonces, esta práctica ha sido incorporada en el Código de Derecho Canónico (1983) y en el Código de Cánones de las Iglesias Orientales (1990).

Hay varias pautas a tener en cuenta con respecto a la cremación:

- 1) Las cenizas del difunto no deben ser esparcidas.
- 2) Las cenizas no deben separarse ni compartirse entre la familia.
- 3) Las cenizas deben ser tratadas con el mismo respeto y dignidad que el cuerpo humano y ser guardadas en lugares sagrados. Esto consolida un principio fundamental de nuestra fe: la creencia en la resurrección. Además, el alojamiento de los restos cremados en esos lugares sagrados permite que se ore por los difuntos cuando se celebran misas en el cementerio.
